Saw Mill

Picked up 3 loads from a site in South Windsor. It happened that I was delivering pellets to a customer when I noticed the tree guys starting on a stand of white pine. So I wandered over to talk to them. We still need 12' and 16 foot material any way we can get it.

LOST! We had two log tongs with chains for lifting logs off trailers. I vaguely recall someone borrowing them a year or more ago. We don't use them as much now that the skid steer has a grapple bucket, but we really would like them back for those times when the skid steer is unavailable. Hopefully, this will stir a memory in someone!

We have about 60 of the 2"X12"X16' rafters needed for the 2nd engine building but 80 more need to be cut. All of the posts have been cut as well. So, our emphasis remains on producing the necessary materials for the second engine building. We can now store lumber under the rear shed roof of the new tractor building, giving us more room under the mill.

2nd Engine Building

Excavation has been started on this project. And then the rains came! I'm hopeful that we can get it graded before the show and ready for footings. We modified the structure to enclose the rear and both sides. This will allow for our new engine collection to be housed indoors. The front of the building will have a shed roof for the Wichman engine and some other engines for display. The plan is to have all the foundation work complete and ready for concrete floor in the early spring. Construction to follow.

Pavillion

The pavilion is complete and will be inspected next week. We should be open for the show!

Engine collection purchase

We have moved a good portion of these engines from Kent and have them in the tractor building on static display pending construction of the next engine building. We've had a great crew of volunteers, trucks and trailers, making the project simple. The remaining engine is at Ray's shop and we are ready to get it, but the crane guy has a medical

issue. So it's temporarily on hold. We also have been made aware of two rare hot air engines that Ray will part with. It's under discussion.

The addition of this collection and the Bob Chester Memorial Engine Building will easily make us the largest engine display in New England! Quite an accomplishment!

While we have had an exciting time hauling the Ray Dezara engine collection to the Farm, we still have one more to pick up! Hopefully after our show we will be able to orchestrate another day with the crane and a tag trailer, and then the move will be complete. Once that is done, then they all get moved into our soon-to-be new engine building. I made a rough plan for the engine layout to maximize space, ease movement between engines, and in the cases of engines with clutches, position them against a wall. That would give us the option of making a trap door in the wall to pass belting through so we can run displays set up outside the building, if so desired.

In our current engine building, Ethan and I have begun to weld up the framework to hold the lineshaft for the Atlas Imperial engine. Once complete, the Atlas will be belted up to one of the original button machines that it ran, plus other various flat-belt driven machinery.

Several of our farm trucks have been getting some much-needed help thanks to some new volunteers. The black dump truck got a tune up and is in line for a carburetor rebuild, the gray ford and plow truck got brakes, and the blue chevy is having its rotted transmission lines gone through.

We're all looking forward to a great Fall show. If you're interested in helping out, make sure to stop by and see what there is to be done!

Shortly after the Colchester Historical Society acquired the title to the Zagray farm in 2000 they paid to have the property surveyed . They did this for two reasons. First, they knew that there had been a dispute between the Zagray family and an adjoining property owner. Second, they realized that a survey would be necessary if they ever wanted to harvest timber from the wooded part of the farm.

Twenty years have passed and the Zagray Farm Museum could use the proceeds from a timber harvest to help pay for the Dezara engine purchase. Now is the time for us to contact the three big logging firms in Connecticut and start a science based forest management project on the Zagray land east of the air line trail. I estimate that a good size firm could harvest all of the appropriate trees in about 1 month.
